What are human beings?

Common-sense vs. scientific perspective.

Human beings can be conceived in two deeply different and seemingly conflicting ways. On the one hand, they can viewed as *persons* – that is, beings endowed with a special, private point of view on what goes on in their own minds, who often act rationally by exercising their free will and are morally responsible for what thereby do. This is the *common-sense* (or objective) perspective. On the other hand, humans can be seen as mere material bodies, which obey the same natural laws that rule over all the other physical entities. In the latter perspective there seems to be no place for consciousness, freedom and responsibility. This is the *scientific* (or objective) perspective. One of the greatest difficulties in the history of human thought – one that is strikingly evident today – concerns the possibility of whether these two perspectives can be reconciled, and in case how and up to which point. In these three talks we will discuss this "reconciliation problem" from three different vantage points, respectively connected with the issue of free will, the mind-body problem and the question of consciousness.
