The university has 203 endowed professorships—all with stories as unique as the donors who established them and the long line of faculty who will have the distinction of holding the chairs.




Medical Mutual of Ohio has doubled its impact at Case Western Reserve University through two endowed professorships.

Weatherhead School of Management's John R. Mannix Medical Mutual of Ohio Professorship in Health Care Finance, which honors Mannix as the pioneer of prepaid health service in the United States, is currently held by James Rebitzer, Ph.D., an expert in health care economics.
