HOW IT WORKS

Food waste is separated into unique categories and then reported on a tablet which shares that data in real time on the team's Café Manager page.




Waste is separated and reported in categories which were created to capture information that is actionable for chefs. In addition to the categories below, teams can also opt to track guest plate waste and/or catering leftovers.



Foundation: Culture Change for Climate Change

- Provost's Office funded Seed sprint, initially one year time frame
- Intent:
 - Harmonize and scale climate action at CWRU
 - Build connections and collaborations across campus and with our neighboring communities
 - Promote awareness of all climate / sustainability actions happening on campus
- Original Team: 6 co-leads, 10 faculty, 6 staff, 6 students, many centers, cores, & institutes; now 75 members across schools



Progress: CWRU CAN!


Transdisciplinary intergenerative storytelling in action
