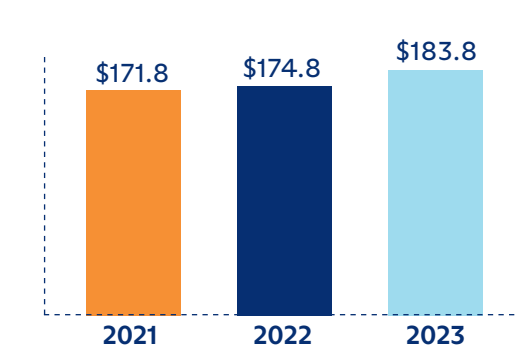

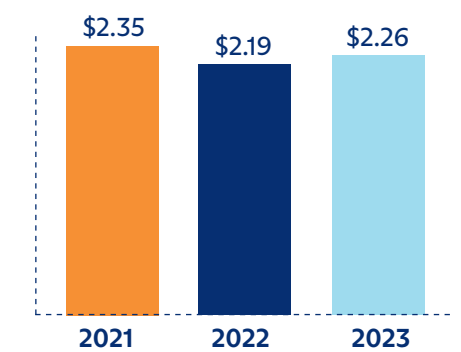

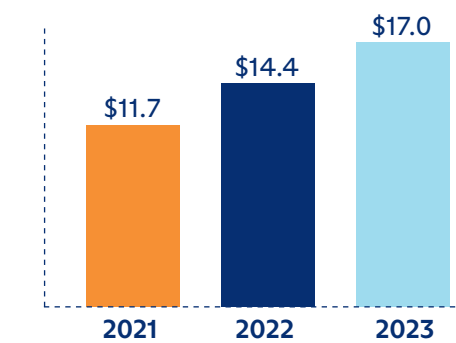
Gifts and pledges from private sources (in millions)



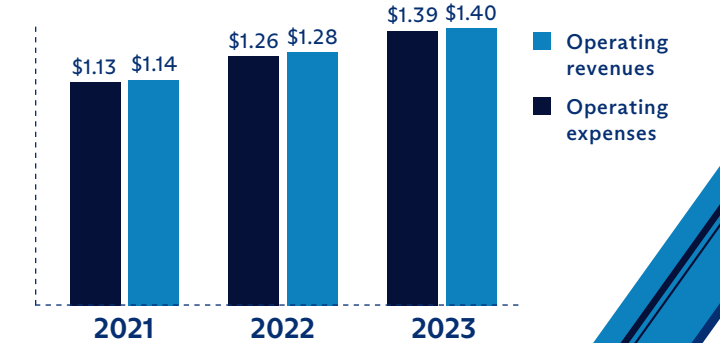
Total endowment balance (in billions):

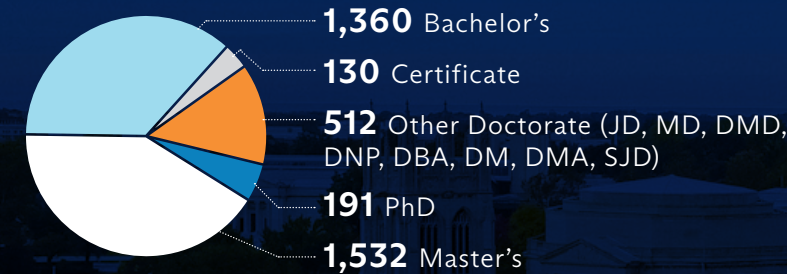
