#### **Capstone & Departmental Honors**

The Capstone in Music (MUHI 395A-B) is not required but if taken counts as a Music History elective (section V above) and makes student eligible for Departmental Honors. Music majors who maintain a GPA of 3.75 or above in the major and who complete an ambitious and outstanding Music Capstone project (MUHI 395A-B) can earn Departmental Honors by faculty nomination and vote of the Department of Music faculty. The distinction appears on the transcript, is announced at commencement, and is printed in the commencement program.

## Sample Four-Year Plan of Music Courses

The BA Music program requires that 43-51 of the total 120 semester credit hours necessary for the degree be devoted to music study, with the remaining credits devoted to the Unified General Education Requirements (UGER), a possible second major or a minor program, and a liberal selection of elective courses.
