## Capstone \& Departmental Honors

The Capstone in Music (MUHI 395A-B) is not required but if taken counts as a Music History elective (section V above) and makes student eligible for Departmental Honors. Music majors who maintain a GPA of 3.75 or above in the major and who complete an ambitious and outstanding Music Capstone project (MUHI 395A-B) can earn Departmental Honors by faculty nomination and vote of the Department of Music faculty. The distinction appears on the transcript, is announced at commencement, and is printed in the commencement program.

## Sample Four-Year Plan of Music Courses

The BA Music program requires that 43-51 of the total 120 semester credit hours necessary for the degree be devoted to music study, with the remaining credits devoted to the Unified General Education Requirements (UGER), a possible second major or a minor program, and a liberal selection of elective courses. ## Unified General Education Requirement (UGER)

All CWRU undergraduates, including music majors, must fulfill the Unified General Education Requirements (UGER). A detailed list requirements may be found in the General Bulletin. Note that it is often possible for a single course to count toward multiple UGER requirements and/or toward UGER requirements and the music major.

## I. Skills Requirements ( 15 credit hours)

This category falls into three skill areas and subareas: (a) Written, Oral, and Multimodal Communication, (b) Quantitative Reasoning, and (c) Wellness. Skill requirement categories and course options are outlined in the UGER requirements online.

## Skill: Written, Oral, and Multimodal Communication

Students will complete one Academic Inquiry Course (AIQ), two Communication Intensive Courses (CI), one Disciplinary Course (DC), one Capstone (Cap), and a Portfolio.

Academic Inquiry Course (1 course required, 3 credits)
This course covers introductory reading, writing, and academic inquiry skills that are associated with university settings.

Communication Intensive Courses ( 2 courses required, 3 credits each)
Communication-Intensive (CI) courses use writing/communication to enhance students' learning of the course content. Students use writing and other forms of communication to engage with course topics and questions in ways that demonstrate their growing participation in academic inquiry and knowledge-making.

Disciplinary Course (1 course required, 3 credits)
Disciplinary Writing (DW) courses introduce students to disciplinary and professional forms of communication, including questions, ethics, processes, and modes of response common to a specific academic discipline.

Capstone Course ( 1 course required, 3 credits)
Students use what they have learned at CWRU to design a project that responds meaningfully to a question, problem, or issue that matters in the discipline of their choosing. The writing/communication focus of Capstone Projects includes "translating" specialized, disciplinary knowledge for a diverse general audience.

## Student Experience Portfolio (1 required)

Student curate a collection of materials, including artifacts from each course in the sequence (including the "public-facing" written or multimodal presentation of the senior capstone project); one or more reflective documents that provide space for synthesis of learning and self- assessment; and additional documents (related to the Explore curriculum) and/or students' own preferences (e.g., create a public professional portfolio).

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## Skill: Quantitative Reasoning (1 required)

Students take one course of at least 3 credits using mathematical, statistical, computing and/or data analytic methods for understanding and addressing concerns that are important to their profession and to society in general.

Skill: Wellness (2 required)
Students must pass at least two semesters' worth of enrollments in Wellness courses through a combination of full-semester and half-semester courses, regardless of the credit-hours attached to the courses. At least one semester's worth of enrollments must be in courses designated as including significant active participation in physical movement. Courses that satisfy the Wellness requirement engage students in the development and application of wellness-related knowledge to promote a lifestyle that will improve the quality of life for themselves and their communities. [NOTE: MUDE 101 and 102 fulfill this requirement]

## II. Perspectives Requirements (at least 4 credit hours)

This category falls into four perspectives: Moral and Ethical Reasoning (MER), Understanding Global Perspectives (UGP), Human Diversity and Commonality (HDC), and Local and Global Engagement (LGE). Students will satisfy many of these perspectives as part of their majors, with additional ones taken as breadth or elective courses. Complete information about the UGER requirements and course options can be found online.

Moral and Ethical Reasoning (MER) (at least 1 credit hour)
Courses or course sequences in this category include a critical examination of essential questions of morality, ethical theories, or applied ethics in a variety of contexts spanning cultures, historical time periods, organizations, or individuals. These courses help students to reflect on ethical theories and frameworks, cultural values, or social consequences of ethical choices in either theoretical or concrete ways.

Understanding Global Perspective (UGP) (at least 1 credit hour)
Courses or course sequences in this category explore one or more cultures outside the United States and expand students’ perspectives on their own cultural assumptions, traditions, and experiences and/or the impact of the United States in an international context.

Human Diversity and Commonality (HDC) (at least 1 credit hour)
Courses and course sequences in this category address one or more categories of human diversity (e.g., race, ethnicity, gender, sexuality, class, age, religion, and other cultural practices) to provide students with new understandings of cultural variation, similarity, and change, or how one's actions could have disparate impacts on different peoples.

Local and Global Engagement (LGE) (at least 1 credit hour)
Courses, course sequences, and activities in this category engage with communities beyond the university classroom to promote civic engagement or community service. They facilitate the development of civic or societal responsibilities and the deeper understanding of communities in Cleveland, nationally, or around the world through experiential learning, co-ops, internships, research in faculty labs, community-based work, foreign language study, or an immersive study abroad program.
