ABOUT

Mikhail Grazhdanov is a multi-keyboardist from Russia. Currently he is pursuing a DMA in historical performance at Case Western Reserve University, where he studies with Francesca Brittan (fortepiano), Peter Bennett (harpsichord), and Jonathan Moyer (organ). His professional appearances include performances with the American Bach Soloists Academy, Cleveland State University production of Handel's Acis and Galatea, CWRU HPP showcases at the Boston Early Music Festival and Early Music America Summit. As part of Duo CPE with soprano Andréa Walker, Mikhail was featured in the Emerging Artist Showcase at the Early Music America Summit 2024, and performed at the Early Music Seattle Spring Festival 2025. In the summer of 2024 he participated in two prestigious early music competitions: the 10th Jurow International Harpsichord Competition in Montreal (most promising semi finalist prize) and the Musique Antique Fortepiano Competition in Brugge (semifinals).

Praised for her "full bodied, rich, and warm tone" (Cleveland.com), chamber musician and educator **Ann Yu** finds limitless inspiration in exploring multiple genres and musical styles in the historical and modern musical worlds, leading her to unique and groundbreaking projects with Apollo's Fire, the Poiema Trio, the Caroga Arts Collective, Project: Music Heals Us, CLE Concierto, among many others. Yu received her bachelors and masters degrees studying with Jaime Laredo, Jan Sloman, and William Preucil at the Cleveland Institute of Music and currently studies baroque violin with Julie Andrijeski and Alan Choo. For fun, she loves to sightread quartets, cook for friends, hike the national park, and dance lindy hop and blues.

Jaap ter Linden, cellist, gambist and conductor, has a long history in the historical performance world. His many tours have taken him throughout Europe, Japan, Australia, and the United States. He performed and recorded ensemble repertoire with the world's finest interpreters (pianists Ronald Brautigam and David Breitman, violinists Andrew Manze, Elizabeth Wallfisch and John Holloway and harpsichordists Richard Egarr and Lars Ulrik Mortensen). As conductor, he has worked with ensembles such as the Handel and Haydn Society, Philharmonia, Portland, and Lyra Baroque; Arion and Tafelmusik; the Wroclaw Symfonie in Poland; Bordeaux Opera in France, and many others performing repertoire from the 18th and 19th centuries, from Purcell to Mendelssohn and Schubert.
