The Maltz Performing Arts Center (est. 1924), a unique collaboration formed in March 2010 between Case Western Reserve University and The Temple-Tifereth Israel, is a landmark venue on the university's campus. Thanks to the generosity of Milton and Tamar Maltz and other philanthropic leaders, this center has become a vibrant hub for music, lectures, and cultural events. Historic Silver Hall, with seating for 1,200, hosts performances by Case Western Reserve's music ensembles and serves as the stage for the Silver Hall Concert Series, which draws thousands of guests each season. The center also hosts the university's Think Forum lecture series and the Cuyahoga County Public Library's Writers Center Stage, making it a key destination for the Cleveland community. The Nord Family Greenway beautifully connects the center to the rest of campus and the surrounding University Circle neighborhoods.

Before coming to CWRU, Jojo participated in the Houston Youth Symphony and was a three-time TMEA All-State cellist, ranking 2nd in the state of Texas in 2020. Beyond performance, she serves on the executive board of the Music Undergraduate Student Involvement Committee, does research at the Cleveland Clinic, and volunteers in healthcare in the Cleveland area. She is an aspiring physician and hopes to integrate the discipline, creativity, and empathy cultivated through music into her future medical career. Jojo is grateful for the guidance of Dr. Mercer, her family, her friends, and the CWRU music faculty, all of whom have shaped her musical journey.



ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

Michelle Bushkova, born in Moscow in 2004, is a violinist, pianist, and conductor. She is a graduate from both the Gnessin Music College and the Central Music School by the Moscow Tchaikovsky Conservatory. Currently she studies at the Cleveland Institute of Music with Ilya Kaler and Olga Dubossarskaya-Kaler on the violin; and Antonio Pompa-Baldi on the piano. In 2023, Michelle began her conducting studies. Since then, her mentors have included Kathleen Horvath, Carlos Kalmar, Jorma Panula, Anthony Parnther, and Victor Yampolsky. She has performed as a soloist with the "Moscow Virtuosi" and "New Russia" Symphony orchestras in Moscow, the philharmonic orchestras of Saratov, Yaroslavl, Ankara, Istanbul, and the chamber orchestras of Minsk (Belarus) and Portland (Oregon, US). As an instrumentalist, Michelle has participated in international music festivals such as: "Keshet Eilon" (Israel) "Stayin-May" Florida, US), "Musica Mundi" (Belgium), NYMF in Gstaad (Switzerland), Moscow Autumn" (Moscow), and "Siletz Bay" (Oregon, US). As a conductor, she took part in the Conducting Intensive at the Juilliard School, and the International Jorma Panula Masterclass in Kecskemét (Hungary). Michelle has been appointed undergraduate assistant conductor of the Case Western Reserve University Symphony Orchestra beginning in the academic year 2024-25.

Dr. Kathleen A. Horvath serves as Professor of String Education/Pedagogy, Director of Orchestras at Case Western Reserve University, Area Head of Performing Ensembles, and Associate Provost for Academic Affairs. She also holds an additional appointment as Instructor of Double Bass and Conducting at the Cleveland Institute of Music. Her work on campus includes serving as Director of the Case University Circle Symphony Orchestra, teaching courses in Music Education including String Methods, Conducting, Assessment and supervising student teachers. Her work in the Provost's Office centers are accreditation and student retention. She holds a Bachelor of Music from the Eastman School of Music (Double Bass), a Master of Arts in Performance and String Pedagogy, and Doctor of Philosophy in Music Education from The Ohio State University.

In demand as a clinician, conductor, performer and adjudicator, she has presented at many National, State, and International conferences and has Guest Conducted Festivals in 36 states. Her research is primarily focused on the prevention of performance related injuries through correct positioning of the body and the accompanying teaching methodology that facilitates accurate muscle development. She is also an author of several string publications including the two volume method book series New Directions for Strings, A Scale in Time and String Premiere a with co-authors Robert McCashin, Joanne Erwin and Brenda Mitchell. Additionally, she continues to actively teach and perform as a bassist. For fun and adventure she enjoys spending time outside camping, cycling, kayaking, and hiking.
