



In addition to *Stay True*, he is the author of *A Floating Chinaman: Fantasy and Failure Across the Pacific*.

He currently teaches at Bard College and has previously taught at Harvard University and Vassar College. Hsu serves on the executive boards of the Asian American Writers' Workshop and Critical Minded, an initiative to create opportunities for cultural critics of color. He was formerly a fellow at the New America Foundation and the Dorothy and Lewis B. Cullman Center at the New York Public Library.


