Academic Support Resources for Students

Join staff members for a discussion about academic resources, programs and services to help students achieve their academic goals. Learn about Supplemental Instruction (SI); Peer Tutoring; Study Group +1; Spoken English programs and seminars; and one-on-one assistance with time management, study skills, test-taking, note-taking strategies and spoken English. Presenters will also discuss UNIV 100, a popular five-week, non-credit seminar on study skills and time management available to students during both halves of the fall and spring semesters.

Campus Services: "At Your Service"

Learn the basics about campus services: meal plans, local transportation options, car-sharing and more. Information will be provided about the CaseOneCard and its uses both on and around campus.

Dean of Students: Advocacy & Support at CWRU

The Dean of Students Office supports students on their journey to become empowered self-advocates who are able to identify and overcome obstacles to ensure their holistic success and wellness. 
Study Abroad Redefined: Developing the Competitive Edge
