S.A.C. VOLUNTEER AWARD

The Robin Kramer Volunteer Award honors a staff member whose volunteer service to the campus community has had a significant impact on colleagues, students, or visitors.

Case Western Reserve University created the Robin Kramer Volunteer Award in honor of Robin Kramer, a university employee whose qualities and commitment to volunteerism set a standard for distinguished service. Robin Kramer (August 5, 1955 - November 1, 2013) was known for her passion for serving the University and its employees. Robin was a friendly and familiar face of the Staff Advisory Council (SAC) and loved to welcome new members at the SAC New Member Orientation. She also co-chaired the Elections and Staff Recognition Committees. Her family, friends, and co-workers remember her for her infectious smile, contagious laugh, concern, loyalty, and the support she demonstrated to the University community. Robin's enthusiasm and energy were evident in everything she did.



BRIAN GRAY
Librarian 4, Library Services

Brian Gray has exhibited steadfast leadership of Garden@Case over the years! That beautiful vegetable garden on the north side of

campus is currently a part of the Cleveland "Summer Sprout" program. Brian coordinates a spreadsheet of volunteers (faculty, students, and staff) who take turns with daily visits to the garden during the growing season to plant, weed, water, and harvest food for local food banks. Brian does a lot of behind-the-scenes work, coordinating with Summer Sprout, choosing plant types or finding out what's needed, getting seeds and plants, turning over beds, connecting to Facilities & Grounds staff who maintain the area, replacing hoses and finding plant supports, using organic pest control, and choosing and arranging for delivery/pick up of produce. He has hosted "open houses" to teach others about the garden and gardening skills and to orient new volunteers by showing them around and telling them the history of the garden. When the spreadsheet cells don't fill for every single day, he goes over and waters. Brian is patient, reliable, steadfast, enthusiastic, and committed to the mission and history of the garden. He is a kind leader, providing tours of the garden and sending gentle reminders when more people are needed on the signup sheet, or when he needs the team to do more of one thing or less of another. He explains things like why a container needs to be watered daily, how to make sure the hose is fully turned off, or what that white stuff is on the tomato plants and why organic strategies are used to minimize it. He asks people's opinions, and sometimes those answers show through as he arranges for a new planting or requests staff weed the outer edge of the garden. Brian is responsive to the community's needs by sharing vegetable likes and dislikes from the food banks with the growers. Brian creatively figured out how to keep the garden cared for constantly during the reduced-people-on-campus phases of the pandemic and worked around staff work-from-home schedules. He shares credit, and the results of other volunteers and facilities staff can be seen. Everything about this project makes Brian's team smile.

PRESIDENT'S AWARD FOR DISTINGUISHED SERVICE

The President's Award for Distinguished Service honors up to three staff members every year whose outstanding contributions to our campus culture have a transformational effect on university colleagues, students, or visitors.

JON DONZE
Director, Grants & Contracts

Jon Donze has been at Case Western Reserve University since he graduated and completed his Master of Business Administration. He has worked diligently in the School of Medicine as a department administrator for a number of years. He was promoted and joined the School of Medicine Office of Grants & Contracts, making him a Senior Grants Manager and appointed with signing authority for all Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine research sponsors (federal, state, foundation, industry). Currently, he is the Director of the Office of Grants & Contracts, where his service to the School of Medicine and the university is and has been absolutely pivotal. The grants management electronic system (known as SPARTA) was recently replaced with a new version. Jon's unique expertise on the former and new systems saved the day for many in

the School of Medicine. He worked hard to formulate the new plan and became an expert in the system, training many others. Jon's been managing an office of 5 that used to number 8. Alongside a great team, he manages a heavy workload effectively. The Office of Grants & Contracts team manages nearly 50-90 emails per hour, yet 40 applications to the National Institutes of Health were processed and submitted by his office for the 5 pm deadline on Feb 6.

While he had help, Jon was the lead in gathering the information US News & World Report required regarding the National Institutes of Health grant funding. That is a daunting task as it takes several months of gathering, distilling, and quality checking each item reported to US News involving Case Western Reserve University and the National Institutes of Health Federal grants related to the CWRU biomedical economy. A member on his team has made remarks that they don't think that Jon has had a free weekend since September. What he reports on weighs into Case Western Reserve University's standing nationally as a National Institutes of Health-funded Medical School Research institution. The University was previously ranked lower than #24 and was #24 in 2022. His work was pivotal in the 2023 report which is coming out very soon. In every project, issue, and problem that Jon is involved in, he never displays anything but integrity, honesty, and excellent critical thinking skills. The COVID-19 Pandemic changed so many people and their job trajectories, Jon's nominator requested that this humble, kind, and knowledgeable CWRU staff member be recognized for keeping the tent poles up despite a very heavy tent canvas.
