- Present the <u>Inamori Ethics Prize</u> to global ethical leaders demonstrating outstanding ethical leadership.
- Advise and mentor students, including the CWRU student organization, <u>Global Ethical Leaders Society</u>, to develop future ethical leaders and responsible global citizens.
- Consult on the ethical, legal, and social implications (ELSI) of research and development for partner grants, programs, and initiatives.
- Create and host programs and events, including lectures, panels, and activities.

Education and Action on Ethics, Values, and Justice

The Inamori Center offers and sponsors teaching, training, research, and scholarship in ethics and collaborates with partners and programs, locally and globally. The Inamori Center hosts CWRU undergraduate, graduate, and professional courses. To support student learning, the Inamori Center purchases copies of all of the materials required for these courses for the <u>Inamori Center Library</u>. Our collection of over 1,700 materials is freely available for visitors to use while within the Inamori Center.

Each year, the Inamori Center hosts a series of guest speakers and panel discussions to audiences that include the CWRU campus and local community, as well as the global community, thanks to our ability to livestream. Most events are recorded for the resources section of our <u>website</u> and some are also transcribed and published in our journal, *The International Journal of Ethical Leadership*. **Inamori Center Director, Prof. Shannon E. French and Associate Director, Beth Trecasa**, also contribute to our partners' engagement efforts related to ethics, values, justice, and leadership through guest speaking in courses, programs, and key events.

Graduate Studies in Military Ethics

The Military Ethics master's degree program was created by the CWRU College of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law, and the Inamori Center in 2017. Military Ethics focuses on the core values and moral principles that collectively govern those serving in the military forces of nations around the world and decisions on the use of force stemming from the just war tradition. The program's students are a mix of serving members of the military, law students, and traditional master's level graduate students. In Fall 2024, we welcomed another master's cohort, including U.S. military members and dual-degree students who are earning multiple degrees at CWRU concurrently. We welcomed three U.S. Army Chaplains to Ohio and to this year's cohort, thanks to a pilot collaboration with the U.S. Army's Advanced Civilian Schooling program for select Army officers that prepares them for positions that require advanced degrees.

In Spring 2024, in partnership with the College of Arts and Sciences, we were honored to welcome **Valerie Morkevičius**, **Associate Professor and Chair of Political Science at Colgate University**, as the 2024 Inamori Distinguished Scholar in Military Ethics. Prof. Morkevičius taught **Philosophy 336/436: Military Ethics**, **the Military Profession**, **and International Law** remotely from Colgate University and also traveled to CWRU to meet with students on campus.

Military ethics students traveled to the **U.S. Naval Academy** and **U.S. Army Command and General Staff College (CGSC)** for leadership and ethics conferences. These symposia provide an opportunity for academics, practitioners, and military officers (from the United States and allied nations) to come together and discuss ethics relating to the profession of arms, the practice of state controlled violence, and national security. This year's CGSC theme was maintaining human values in an era of new and emerging technology in the military.





Inamori Center Director and Inamori Professor in Ethics, Shannon E. French, is also the CGSC Foundation's General Hugh Shelton Distinguished Visiting Chair of Ethics. At this year's symposium, she was joined by 2023 Inamori Distinguished Scholar in Military Ethics Prof. Pauline Shanks Kaurin and Inamori Research Associate Dr. Jonathan A. French Flint, who all served as speakers for the event.

Military Ethics: Cards for Humanity

In partnership with the Centre for Military Ethics at King's College London and the European chapter of the International Society for Military Ethics (Euro-ISME), the Inamori Center hosts an app for military ethics education. The Military Ethics: Cards for Humanity app covers broad areas of military ethics with carefully curated questions and resources developed by leading researchers, ethicists, and legal specialists with expertise in the laws of armed combat and international humanitarian law. The app can be downloaded for free on Apple and Android operating systems and currently covers topics in English, Arabic, French, German, Hindi, Portuguese, Russian, Spanish, Serbian, Turkish, and Ukrainian. This year, Prof. French, along with Prof. Valerie Morkevičius and Prof. Jessica Wolfendale, Inamori Center Senior Research Associate and Co-Director of the Military Ethics program, filmed educational videos to supplement the information provided on the app for discussions.

Inamori International Writing Prize

The aim of this prize is to promote the study and application of ethics at the graduate student level. To improve the accessibility of ethics in languages other than English, the Inamori Center publishes in English, Spanish, and French. This year's winners, **United States Army Major Tony Lupo and Chaplain (Major) Brett Newman**, traveled to Tallinn, Estonia for the Euro-ISME annual conference. Both service members were recognized for their scholarship in the field of military ethics with the Inamori International Writing Prize and presented their papers at the conference. After five years of focus on the topic of military ethics, the next call for the writing prize will focus on the ethics of emerging technologies.

Ethics of Emerging Technologies

As new technologies are developed, they both introduce novel ethical issues and highlight existing challenges. It is therefore essential for ethics to keep pace with the speed of innovation. Conversations about ethical implications need to happen early, often, and at every stage throughout the design and creation of new systems and products. If not, problems can get "baked in" and then become much harder to address later in the process. Rather than hindering innovation, the integration of ethics all along the way enhances the process by keeping social, legal, and other critical ethical dimensions at the forefront. The Inamori Center is involved in many projects and grants, concerning everything from artificial intelligence to quantum computing, from improving air quality to inventing and testing artificial blood.

Prof. Shannon E. French is recognized as an expert in the fields of military ethics and ethics of emerging technologies. In addition to her work with CWRU engineers, computer scientists, and bioengineers, she is an active advisor for the Institute for Defense Analysis, the RAND Corporation, and the US Department of Defense on classified new technology in the military. She is also developing her new book, *Artificial Ethics: The Impact of Emerging Technologies on Human Value(s)*, (working title, which is under contract with Rowman & Littlefield/Bloomsbury Publishers).

Dr. Émile Torres is the newest Inamori Center postdoctoral scholar. Prof. French serves as their faculty mentor and their research efforts in the role focus on biotechnology and quantum computing. Dr. Torres helps to ensure that ethical considerations are integrated into every aspect of research and development. They arrived at CWRU in November 2023 and are continuing through the 2024-2025 academic year. Dr. Torres recently earned their PhD in philosophy at Leibniz Universität Hannover in Germany. In addition to teaching, their current projects include:

Each year, Prof. French presents on ethics, leadership, <u>military ethics</u>, and <u>ethics of emerging technologies</u> across our campus and to audiences worldwide. Her lecture audiences range from various ranks and rooms of domestic and international military service members to small chats with students in the Inamori Center, from all computer science majors at CWRU to Zoom conversations with computer scientists in Brazil.

Inamori Ethics Prize Events

The Inamori Ethics Prize honors outstanding international ethical leaders whose actions and influence have greatly improved the condition of humankind. All events are open to the public free of charge. The Prize recipient also meets with groups of students and community members throughout the visit. The ceremony and symposium are made available online and transcribed for *The International Journal of Ethical Leadership*.

In September 2023, it was our honor and privilege to recognize Myroslava Gongadze, journalist and free-press and human rights advocate, for her outstanding contributions to humankind by awarding her with the Inamori Ethics Prize. Her commitment to upholding justice and ensuring civil liberties—for people in Ukraine and around the world—and her persistent efforts to seek and speak the truth are an inspiration.





The Inamori Ethics Prize ceremony and symposium for our 2024 recipient, Dr. Anthony Fauci, will be held on campus of Case Western Reserve University on September 19, 2024. Dr. Anthony Fauci, a physician, immunologist, and infectious disease expert, has cared not only for the nation's health, but also the health of the world. We look forward to welcoming him to campus and welcoming guests, in-person and online.

Developing Ethical Leaders

As part of our aim to cultivate the next generation of ethical leaders, the Inamori Center advises and sponsors the CWRU student organization, <u>Global Ethical Leaders Society (GELS)</u>. Membership is open to undergraduates, graduate students, and professional students. GELS members learn how to enhance their leadership skills, analyze complex moral issues, inspire others to support ethical policies, and play an active role in promoting ethical progress on a global scale. Each year, GELS members elect an Executive Board that is responsible for GELS organization, programs, communications, membership, and finances. Some of the topics GELS members explored this year include the ethics of: Supreme Court Cases; Academic Integrity; DNA Databases; Canon; K-pop; Adoption; Investigative Techniques; Merit and College Admissions; Journal Access: Who Owns the Knowledge; and Elections.

In Fall 2023, GELS welcomed a panel of local community experts to explore the role of clinical ethicists: **Intersections in Clinical Ethics, Nursing, Law, and Liability**. This event brought together professionals with vast experience in ethics, healthcare, law, philosophy, and education to expand our campus community's

understanding of clinical ethics. GELS moderated the conversation with legal expert Olubukunola Dwyer from University Hospitals, Dr. Georgina Morley from the Cleveland Clinic, and Dr. Ben Schwan from MetroHealth. Event video is available on our <u>website</u>, and the transcript will be available in the 11th volume of *IJEL*.

Students also learn about leadership in a variety of settings off campus. The Inamori Center funds students to travel for experiential learning projects, conference attendance, research, service, and other activities, locally and globally. This Summer, Issaac Opoku is serving as an Complaint Investigation Specialist for the American Civil Liberties Union of Missouri to provide high-quality support to individuals seeking assistance with civil rights issues. Fred Lee is serving as a Volunteer Student Affiliate at the Sydney School of Public Health in Australia conducting research on blood-borne viruses in organ donations.

In January 2024, four CWRU undergraduate and graduate students and Beth Trecasa, Inamori Center Associate Director and GELS Advisor, attended the annual **U.S. Naval Academy's Leadership Conference**. They were able to meet and collaborate with students, faculty, and staff from military and civilian institutions of higher education across the United States and across the globe.





This Spring, Beth Trecasa, joined volunteers in Ashtabula, Ohio to set up dental and medical clinics at an area high school with **Remote Area Medical (RAM)**. Stan Brock, 2010 Inamori Ethics Prize recipient, established Remote Area Medical in 1985. RAM delivers free health care services to communities in the United States and isolated regions around the world, including, vision, dental, and medical care. This academic year, a group of CWRU students who were also inspired by RAM's mission established a <u>CWRU chapter of RAM</u>. The Inamori Center is proud to partner with this new student organization and sponsored their Summer 2024 service trip. Eleven students traveled to Sharon, Pennsylvania this June to serve as early morning to late evening support in opening, running, and closing the Remote Area Medical's clinics over a three-day weekend.





The International Journal of Ethical Leadership

The Inamori Center has published *The International Journal of Ethical Leadership (IJEL)* in partnership with the University of Akron Press since 2012. This interdisciplinary journal creates a trusted forum for an international exchange of ideas on the theory and practice of ethical leadership for readers around the world to explore historical, current, and emerging issues in global ethics and leadership.

IJEL is a print and online publication. While always in print, the journal has been published online since February 2020 in the CWRU School of Law's *Scholarly Commons*. Since then, *IJEL* articles and transcripts have been downloaded nearly 38,000 times in 186 countries by individuals representing over 2400 different organizations. This compares to nearly 27,000 downloads, 182 countries, and over 1,800 organizations at this same time last year.

Develop pilot funding and endowed support for ethics at CWRU and create a Presidential/Provost-level fundraising campaign for:


- additional Inamori Center human infrastructure through staffing;
