# 2024-2025 Inamori Center Outcomes Education and Action on Ethics, Values, and Justice

The Inamori Center offers and sponsors teaching, training, research, and scholarship in ethics and collaborates with partners and programs, locally and globally. The Inamori Center hosts CWRU undergraduate, graduate, and professional courses in our classroom spaces. Each year, the Inamori Center hosts a series of guest speakers and panel discussions to audiences that include the CWRU campus and local community, as well as the global community. Most events are recorded for the <u>Resources</u> section of our website and some are also transcribed and published in our journal, *The International Journal of Ethical Leadership*.

**Inamori Center Director, Prof. Shannon E. French** and **Associate Director, Beth Trecasa**, also contribute to our partners' programs related to ethics, values, justice, and leadership by guest speaking in courses, programs, and at events. Some key speaking engagements with student groups this year include:

- What Are Your Ethics and Why?: A conversation with the <a href="Emerging Leaders Program">Emerging Leaders Program</a>, which provides first-year students the opportunity to develop their leadership skills, build relationships across campus, and become engaged in the campus community.

#### **Ethics of Existing and Emerging Technologies**

It is essential for ethics to keep pace with the speed of technological innovation. Conversations about ethical implications need to happen early, often, and at every stage throughout the design and creation of new systems and products. This enhances the process by keeping societal, legal, and other critical ethical dimensions at the forefront. It also helps generate new ideas by adding fresh, interdisciplinary perspectives and protects developers from being surprised by problems later. **Prof. Shannon E. French** leads the Inamori Center's ELSI research partnerships within CWRU and with external scientists and engineers with the support of **Dr. Émile Torres**, who has served as the Inamori Center's **Postdoctoral Scholar in the Ethics of Emerging Technologies** since 2023. Dr. Torres helps to ensure that ethical considerations are integrated into every aspect of research and development. Key ELSI projects:

### **ELSI Think Tank**

The Inamori Center hosted its first annual ELSI Think Tank this Spring. This event created space for attendees to explore the ethical, legal, and societal implications of existing and emerging technologies, such as: robotics, computer science, data science, engineering, biomedical engineering, medicine, human enhancement, augmented/virtual reality, novel materials, and artificial intelligence. The ELSI Think Tank included a **Symposium Space** to listen and learn from expert ELSI Advisors who had conversations with technology developers and took questions from the audience. An **Exhibit Space** was also included to provide the opportunity to observe and interact with existing and emerging physical, digital, and theoretical technologies and also talk with technology developers, technology utilizers, ELSI Advisors, and emerging student ELSI Advisors. ## **Inamori International Writing Prize**

The aim of this prize is to promote the study and application of ethics at the graduate student level. This year's call for papers focused on the ethical, legal, and societal implications in the research and development of technology. Izabella Sabharwal de Bessenyey, from The Leverhulme Centre for the Future of Intelligence at the University of Cambridge, United Kingdom, was recognized for her scholarship, *A Care-Centred Approach to AI in Education to Cultivate Academic Confidence and Motivation*, with the 2025 Inamori International Writing Prize. In an effort to foster global discussion of pressing issues on these topics and accessibility in languages other than English, the Inamori Center publishes the winning papers, in print and online, in multiple languages, as special volumes of *The International Journal of Ethical Leadership*.

#### **Graduate Studies in Military Ethics**

The CWRU **Military Ethics master's degree program** focuses on the core values and moral principles that collectively govern those serving in the military forces of nations around the world and decisions on the use of force stemming from the just war tradition. The program's students are a mix of serving members of the military, veterans, law students, and traditional civilian master's level graduate students. In Fall 2024, we welcomed another cohort of master's students, including another two U.S. Army Chaplains. The **U.S. Army's Advanced Civilian Schooling** program allows for Army officers to participate in intensive study and prepare for positions that require advanced degrees. Following graduation this Summer, the chaplains are now teaching ethics and leadership to enlisted members at Fort Bragg in North Carolina and Fort Novosel in Alabama.

This year, military ethics program students traveled to the **U.S. Naval Academy** and **U.S. Army Command and General Staff College (CGSC)** for leadership and ethics conferences. These events provide an opportunity for students, academics, practitioners, and military officers (from the United States and allied nations) to come together and discuss ethics relating to the profession of arms, the practice of state controlled violence, and national security.

In Spring 2025, in partnership with the College of Arts and Sciences, we welcomed back **Dr. Jonathan A. French Flint** as an Inamori Emerging Scholar to teach Philosophy 336/436: Military Ethics, the Military Profession, and International Law. Dr. French Flint also serves as an Inamori Center Research Associate. He recently contributed to a conversation with *The New York Post*: Russia escalates nuclear threat amid Ukraine war, are we a step closer to annihilation? He earned his doctoral degree from the University of Hull in the United Kingdom with a focus on *Strategic Restraint: Modeling the Role of Moral Weight in Modern Conflicts*.

This May, Inamori Center Director and Prof. Shannon E. French debated at <a href="the-Oxford Union">the Oxford Union</a> —the oldest debating organization in the world, located at Oxford University in the United Kingdom. She was honored to be invited to this historic event and was paired with Dr. Sean McFate to debate on the topic of whether or not to hold arms manufacturers accountable for war crimes.



Prof. French is also an active advisor for the Institute for Defense Analysis, the RAND Corporation, and the US Department of Defense on classified new technology in the military. The 3rd edition of her book, *The Code of the Warrior: Exploring Warrior Values Past and Present*, includes two new chapters and will be released on August 28, 2025.

### **Inamori Ethics Prize Events**

The Inamori Ethics Prize honors outstanding international ethical leaders whose actions and influence have greatly improved the condition of humankind. All events are open to the public free of charge. The Prize recipient also meets with groups of students and community members throughout the visit. The ceremony and symposium are made available online and transcribed for *The International Journal of Ethical Leadership*.

In September 2024, it was our sincere honor to recognize **Dr. Anthony Fauci**, a physician, immunologist, and infectious disease expert, for his lasting, life-saving contributions by awarding him the Inamori Ethics Prize. We are thankful to former Ohio Department of Health Director, **Dr. Amy Acton**; actor, advocate, and 2019 Inamori Ethics Prize recipient, **LeVar Burton**; and Macalester College President, **Dr. Suzanne Rivera** for gathering in conversation to discuss "Addressing Moral Imperatives in Public Health, Locally and Globally" for the 2024 Inamori Ethics Prize Academic Symposium. Inamori Center **Director, Prof. Shannon E. French**, and **Associate Director, Beth Trecasa**, were able to present Dr. Facui with his 2024 Inamori Ethics Prize medal in 2025 (after he was unable to attend our on campus ceremony while recovering from the West Nile virus). Dr. Facui's plaque wearing the Inamori Ethics Prize medal is now proudly displayed with all the other Prize recipients on campus at the Inamori Center.





The Inamori Ethics Prize ceremony and symposium for our next honoree, <u>Oscar Chacón</u>, will be held on campus of Case Western Reserve University on September 26, 2025. With immigration policies and protections being challenged here in the United States and internationally, it is especially meaningful and important to highlight and celebrate his tireless advocacy for human rights and dignity for migrant populations with the 2025 Inamori Ethics Prize. We look forward to welcoming him to campus and welcoming guests, in-person and online.

# **Developing Ethical Leaders**

As part of our aim to cultivate the next generation of ethical leaders and overall responsible global citizens, the Inamori Center advises and sponsors the CWRU student organization, <u>Global Ethical</u> <u>Leaders Society (GELS)</u>. Membership is open to undergraduates, graduate students, and professional students. GELS members learn how to enhance their leadership skills, analyze complex ethical issues,

inspire others to support ethical policies, and play an active role in promoting ethical progress on a global scale. Each year, GELS members elect an Executive Board that is responsible for organizational programs, communications, membership, and finances. Some of the topics GELS members explored this year include Lawfulness vs. Ethics and The Ethics of: Lying; Prostitution; Savior Siblings and Organ Donation; Landlords; Pain Management in Pediatric Medicine; Scientific Journals; Animal Rights; Serial Killers, Luigi, and Medical Insurance; Education Inequality and Feasible Ways to Combat It; and Gene Editing.

This Spring, GELS welcomed a panel of local community experts to be in conversations with students on campus. The **Organizational Responsibility: Climate and Action Justice** panel explored how local nonprofits, government, and enterprise work together for climate justice and sustainability. GELS moderated the conversation with **Ms. Brooke Kahl, ESG Consultant with Blue CSR Strategies** and **Mr. David Hester from the RidAll Green Partnership**, a Cleveland based nonprofit for land restoration, urban agriculture and community health. Discussion questions included: How does the Climate Action Plan by the City of Cleveland impact ongoing and future initiatives at local nonprofits? How do corporations measure success of sustainability goals? When scaling nonprofit projects into profitable enterprise, how do you keep nonprofit values?



Students also learned about leadership in a variety of settings off campus. In January 2025, four CWRU undergraduate and graduate students attended the annual **U.S. Naval Academy's Leadership Conference**. They were able to meet and collaborate with students, faculty, and staff from military and civilian institutions of higher education across the United States and across the globe.



The Inamori Center funds students to participate in experiential learning projects, conference attendance, research, service, and other activities, locally and globally. This Summer, Ayla Grabenbauer

is focused on research ethics and animal welfare as a research assistant in Dr. Allison Hess-Dunning's lab in the Department of Biomedical Engineering at the Case School of Engineering. They are working on the development of tissue phantoms to model scar formation around neural implants. Ayla aims to supplement and/or replace animal models in tissue response studies for intracortical microelectrodes. Kian Burt is investigating the association between caregiver dental anxiety and the child's tooth decay or cavities status in Northeast Ohio. In collaboration with the CWRU School of Dental Medicine and the Community Dentistry Department, Kian aims to reduce disparities in oral health care for minorities and the underserved through research, education, and service.

chapter of Remote Area Medical (RAM) and be a sponsor for their service trip to Sharon, Pennsylvania. Students serve as early morning to late evening support in opening, running, and closing the Remote Area Medical's clinics over a three-day weekend. Stan Brock, 2010 Inamori Ethics Prize recipient, established RAM in 1985 to deliver free health care services to communities in the United States and isolated regions around the world, including, vision, dental, and medical care.

## The International Journal of Ethical Leadership

The Inamori Center has published *The International Journal of Ethical Leadership (IJEL)* in partnership with the University of Akron Press since 2012. This interdisciplinary journal creates a trusted forum for an international exchange of ideas on the theory and practice of ethical leadership for readers around the world to explore historical, current, and emerging issues in global ethics and leadership. *IJEL* is a print publication and is also published online in the CWRU School of Law's *Scholarly Commons*. Since 2020, *IJEL* articles and transcripts have been downloaded nearly 51,000 times in 198 countries/regions by individuals representing over 3000 different organizations. This compares to nearly 38,000 downloads, 186 countries/regions, and over 2400 organizations at this same time last year.
