Study Abroad Registration: EDAB 1 (3) / EXCH 1

Graded P/NP

In order to register in SIS you must have:

- No current academic probation status
- No current student conduct sanctions
- Completed in study abroad application:
 - Passport Questionnaire
 - Visa Questionnaire (if applicable)
 - Learning Content and Assessments
 - Health and Safety Orientation
 - Academic and Culture Orientation (this is that)
 - READ and Sign the "Policies for Study Abroad Course Transfer"





Policies for Study Abroad Course Transfer

For Students Participating in Semester/Academic Year Programs:

- Course Approval Form necessary for credits
- Credits are converted you are responsible for knowing yours
- Need a C or better on the overseas scale for the courses to be transferred
- Courses are transfer credit, which do not factor into CWRU GPA.
- Language policy: if studying in a location where English is not an *official language*, must take a course that advances skills in a language of the host country during each semester of study abroad, if available; may be language instruction or a course taught in a language of the host country
- Stay in good academic standing and full time student status while abroad
- Senior study abroad, check the senior residency requirement w/UG Studies
- Max of 38 hours of transfer credit after matriculation
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How To: Register for EDAB 1 (3) (P/NP)

- Reminder: EDAB 1 v EDAB 3
- Request permission in SIS
- Receive SIS-generated email saying permission was granted
- Go back into SIS and register
- Email your study abroad advisor:
 - Tell them it's done
 - They will then check this item off





CWRU will pay your tuition abroad after

- **You:** Register for EDAB 1 (requirements on previous slides)
 - Turn in your flight itinerary:
 - When advised to do so
 - NOT BEFORE unless you are booking a completely refundable flight!

Course Approval Form

- Signatures Needed:
 - <u>Academic Representatives</u> for courses in their department
 - Major Advisor once all courses are signed by Academic Reps
 - Study Abroad Advisor last
- CWRU course code <u>&</u> number required for transfer (Ex: ECON 300TR)
- Credit Conversions on <u>brochure page</u>
- Other Courses:
 - languages not offered at CWRU are approved by OEA
 - Standing approvals
 - Tech Electives and Substitutions





Transcripts

- Official Transcripts must be sent via postal mail or to <u>studyabroad@case.edu</u> from overseas institution directly
- Needed before courses can be processed for transfer to CWRU
- Retain a copy for your records
- REMEMBER that graduate and professional school applications will require their own separate **official** copies

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Course Timeline & Grading

- To Pass EDAB (or EXCH) the OEA needs:
 - Official Transcript ("I" grade without)
 - Post Program Evaluation ("NP" grade without)
- For Your Overseas Courses to Transfer In:
 - Official Transcript (usually arrives in 1-3 months)
 - Completed Course Approval Form, with:
 - Courses approved by academic representatives
 - All courses taken abroad included
 - Then, Undergraduate Studies puts in grades (approximately 3 week turnaround by Undergraduate Studies)
- Reminder: Academic Systems will be different
 - Grades: Must be "C" or better
 - Credits: Are probably different (EX: 5 ECTS = 2.5 CWRU)
 - Must take, pass, and transfer back at least 12 CWRU credits (even if you don't "need" the course – get it approved!)

Visas – Be thorough!

 - Round trip ticket
 - Admission letter from school
 - Scheduling visa appointments—do so very early!

Identity: Disability and Accessibility

Think about:

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- How will my disability affect which study abroad programs I consider?
- Will I disclose my condition to the Office of Education Abroad or the host program?
- How will I plan ahead to manage my condition before going abroad?
- What barriers might I encounter (both in planning to go abroad, and while abroad), and how will I overcome them?
- How will the resources I have abroad differ from what I am accustomed to at CWRU?
- How may my disability be perceived in my host country?
- What activities or excursions abroad (if any) will I not be able to participate in due to my disability?
- If I need access to medication, supplies, or medical services, will I have access abroad? Will I need documentation to travel with medication (i.e. gender-affirming hormones)?

- Talk to your study abroad advisor about your particular needs, study abroad options, and possible site-specific information pertaining to your disability
- Speak with other students with disabilities to learn out their experiences abroad
- Contact your Disability Resources advisor to request that your letter of accommodation be shared with your study abroad advisor, who will pass along this information to your study abroad institution.



Identity: First Gen

Think about:

- How long do I want to be abroad? There are programs available for different lengths of time - semester, academic year, and summer. Short-term faculty-led options are also available.
- How will my study abroad experience fit into my academic plan at CWRU? There are programs that will help fulfill major and minor requirements so you can still graduate at your scheduled time.
- How will I make studying abroad affordable? See our <u>Financial</u> <u>Information</u> and <u>Scholarships</u> page. Many study abroad scholarships are available specifically to first-generation students

- Discuss plans with your family. Study abroad may be a novel idea to your family, so make sure you can articulate the academic, personal, and professional benefits of the experience. Talk to your family early on and let them know that they can speak with an OEA advisor if they have any questions.
- Speak with other first-generation students to learn about their experiences abroad.
- Be prepared at the Airport!



Identity: LGBTQ+

Think about:



- Will local cultural values and host-country laws affect my decision in where to study abroad?
- Does my LGBTQ+ identity conflict with my host country's religious or cultural values and traditions?
- Do you want/need to be part of a supportive LGBTQ+ community? Are there LBGTQ+ organizations on your host campus or in the community?
- What, if any, safety considerations should I be aware of? Is it safe for me to be out about my sexual and/or gender identity in my host community?
- What is the social perception of members of the LGBTQ+ community in my host culture?
- What role do trans* individuals play in my host culture?
- Does my study abroad program offer LGBTQ+ friendly housing?

- Research what kind of rights LGBTQ+ individuals have in your host country. Are there any specific laws regarding same-sex relationships or associations with LGBTQ+ individuals?
- Connect with previous LGBTQ+ students who have studied abroad to talk about how they navigated/experiences sexual and gender identity in their host country
- Utilize the resources/speak with staff at the LGBT Center on campus before departure to set yourself with as much support as needed.



Identity: Race and Ethnicity

Think about:

- Race Ethnicity
- How is my race/ethnicity perceived in my host country? Are there stereotypes associated with my race/ethnicity?
- Does my host country have a history of ethnic tension, prejudice/discrimination or acceptance/inclusion with my ethnic group?
- Are there laws in the host country governing race relations? Ethnic relations? What protections are offered to ethnic or racial minorities?
- Am I going to be treated the same way in my host country as I am in the U.S.? Will I be in the minority/majority for the first time?
- How will my personal racial or ethnic identity shape my experience abroad?
- How will I react if I encounter racism or other discriminatory behavior?
- How will I feel if I am the only minority in a cohort of other Americans in my program

- Make use of online resources that offer advice, personal narratives and other information.
- Speak with other students from diverse backgrounds who have studied abroad.
- We encourage students to reach out to the <u>Office of Multicultural Affairs (OMA)</u> for additional support.

Potential Considerations for Students with Disabilities

Renyen law prohibits discrimination against persons with physical or mental disabilities in employment, education, and access to health care. Despite this, the government does not always effectively entries these prohibions. Covernment buildings, especially in rural asses, are not accessible to persons with disabilities. Sidewarks and streets are often difficult to navigate, even for people without disabilities. Takis typically cannot accommodute wheelchains.

Renyers with disabilities face limited access to assistive devices, specialist services and a tack of reasonable accommodations in public places. Furthermore, barriers to participation in education persist due to persudice and direct discrimination. There continues to be resistance by planets and school officials to provide resources to students with disabilities. Kangens with disabilities also face difficulty finding employment due, in part, to a relative tack of education compared to persons without disabilities, provides among employers, and tack of reasonable accommodations. As a result, many persons with disabilities like in powers, and without welfare support.
