

# CWRU First-Year Students and Politics

In the late summer and early fall of 2012, over 350 CWRU incoming first year students completed the *CIRP Freshman Survey (TFS)*. The *TFS* includes a range of questions pertaining to students' behaviors, goals, and views. While not the focus of the *TFS*, several items pertain to students' political views and activities. This report highlights how incoming CWRU students responded to those items.

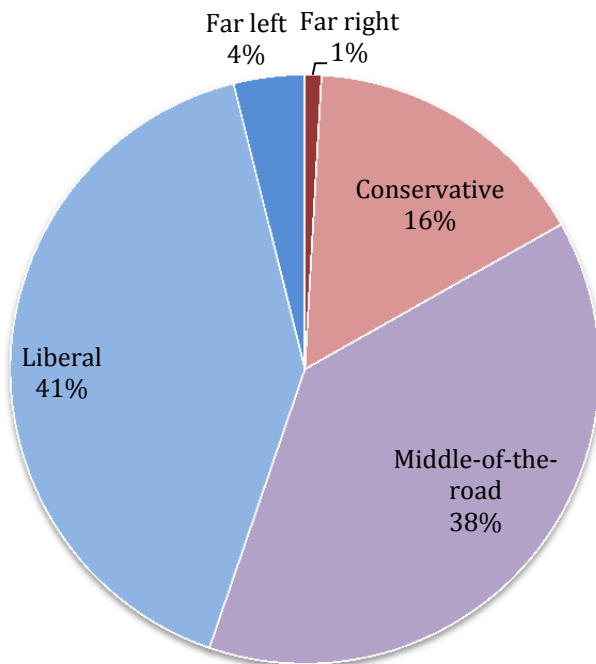
## Political Orientation and Activities

When asked their political orientation, most incoming CWRU students identified themselves as "liberal" or "far left" (45%). Conservatives represented the smallest group, with 17% of students identifying themselves as "conservative" or "far right." Still, a large proportion of students identified themselves as "middle of the road" (38%).

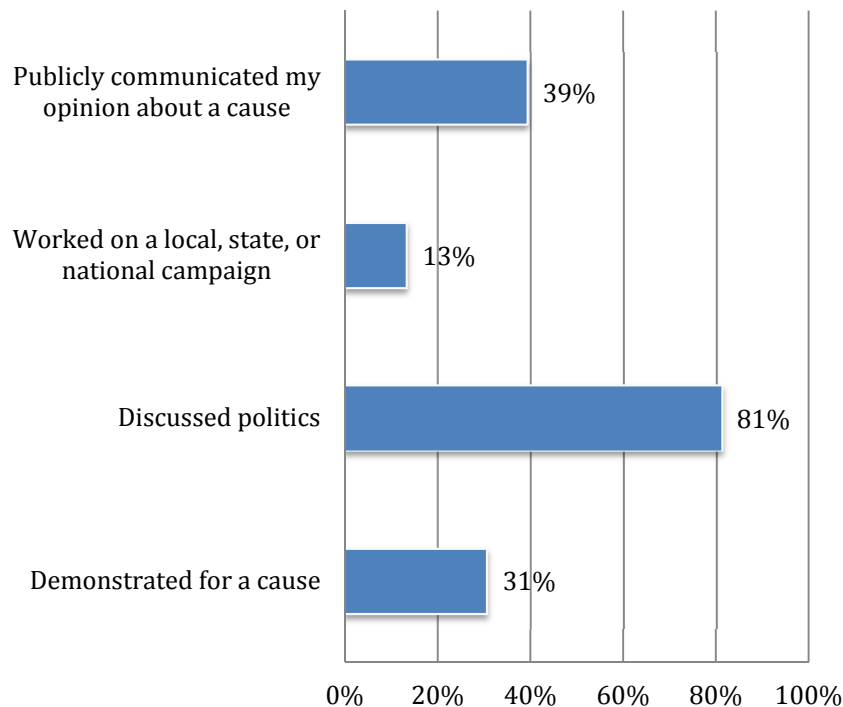
In addition to their political leanings, many students reported being engaged in politics. The vast majority of students (81%) reported they had discussed politics frequently or often. Nearly 40% of students reported publicly communicating their position about a cause frequently or often and approximately 1/3 of students demonstrated for a cause often or frequently.

In addition to political orientation, the TFS also asks the extent to which students agree or disagree on a range of controversial statements. Majorities of students believed that abortion should be legal (86%), that same-sex couples should have the right to legal marital status (85%), that the wealthy should pay a larger share of taxes than they do now (76%), that a national health care plan is needed to cover everybody's medical costs (67%), and colleges should prohibit racist/sexist speech on campus (64%). Most CWRU students (65%) disagreed that students from disadvantaged social class backgrounds should be given preferential treatment in college admissions. However, 79% believed racial discrimination was still a problem in the United States.
