The Maltz Performing Arts Center (est. 1924), a unique collaboration formed in March 2010 between Case Western Reserve University and The Temple-Tifereth Israel, is a landmark venue on the university's campus. Thanks to the generosity of Milton and Tamar Maltz and other philanthropic leaders, this center has become a vibrant hub for music, lectures, and cultural events. Historic Silver Hall, with seating for 1,200, hosts performances by Case Western Reserve's music ensembles and serves as the stage for the Silver Hall Concert Series, which draws thousands of guests each season. The center also hosts the university's Think Forum lecture series and the Cuyahoga County Public Library's Writers Center Stage, making it a key destination for the Cleveland community. The Nord Family Greenway beautifully connects the center to the rest of campus and the surrounding University Circle neighborhoods.

PROGRAM NOTES

Otar Gordeli (1928-1994) was a Soviet Georgian pianist and composer who wrote a variety of works ranging from operetta, symphonic music, choral music, and film scores. He was born in Tiflis (Tbilisi), Georgia and studied piano and composition at the Tiflis Conservatory before obtaining his master's in composition at the Moscow Conservatory. Upon returning to Georgia, he was the head of the Georgian Musical-Choreographic Society and taught at the Tbilisi Conservatory. After the Flute Concerto was written in 1958, he wrote a piano sonata in 1960, and mostly choral, incidental, instrumental music, and romances (Wise Music Classical).

ABOUT THE SOLOIST



SOOAH PARK is a fourth-year Psychology and Music double major and Marketing minor at CWRU, studying flute with Heidi Ruby-Kushious. She was born in Queens, New York and grew up in New Jersey. She started off playing the piano at the age of 5 and then began learning the flute at 9 years old. Sooah chose the flute because it had a special sound that was captivating and pretty! Her hobbies include trying new recipes, baking, and exercising. Performing this concerto in Maltz is a highlight of her musical journey at Case. Before coming to CWRU, Sooah was accepted into numerous county, regional, and honor bands in Northern New Jersey. She received the top Gold rating in the NJ State and Solo Ensemble Festival. ABOUT THE CONDUCTORS

DR. KATHLEEN HORVATH serves as Professor of String Education/Pedagogy, Director of Orchestras, and Associate Provost for Academic Affairs at Case Western Reserve University. She also holds an additional appointment as Instructor of Double Bass and Conducting at the Cleveland Institute of Music. Her work on campus includes serving as Director of the Case University Circle Symphony Orchestra, teaching courses in Music Education including String Methods, Conducting, Assessment and supervising student teachers. Her work in the Provost's Office centers are accreditation and student retention. She holds a Bachelor of Music from the Eastman School of Music (Double Bass), a Master of Arts in Performance and String Pedagogy, and Doctor of Philosophy in Music Education from The Ohio State University.

In demand as a clinician, conductor, performer and adjudicator, she has presented at many National, State, and International conferences and has Guest Conducted Festivals in 36 states. Her research is primarily focused on the prevention of performance related injuries through correct positioning of the body and the accompanying teaching methodology that facilitates accurate muscle development. She is also an author of several string publications including the two volume method book series New Directions for Strings, A Scale in Time and String Premiere a with coauthors Robert McCashin, Joanne Erwin and Brenda Mitchell. Additionally, she continues to actively teach and perform as a bassist. For fun and adventure she enjoys spending time outside camping, cycling, kayaking, and hiking.

DR. ELIZABETH HANKINS holds a Ph.D in Music Education from Case Western Reserve University. She has been the orchestra director at Lakewood High School in Lakewood Ohio for over 34 years, conducting 5 orchestras and teaching music theory, the history of American popular music and piano class. In 2002, she founded "The Lakewood Project" rock orchestra. She has presented at ASTA, OMEA, MayDay Group Colloquium, and the New Directions in Music Education Conference. She was one of 10 finalists for the Grammy Music Educator of the Year in 2017; recognized by Yale School of Music as a Distinguished Music Educator in 2013 and 2015; and Distinguished Alum by Oberlin Conservatory of Music in 2013. She currently serves as the OMEA Orchestra Affairs Chair and recently a two year term on the NAfME Orchestra Council.

NATHANIEL HILL is a senior at the Cleveland Institute of Music (CIM), where he studies classical guitar under Grammy Award winner Jason Vieaux. In addition to his achievements as a guitarist, Nathaniel is an emerging conductor with experience leading a wide range of ensembles and orchestras.

Nathaniel began conducting at the age of 15, attending his first conducting workshop under the direction of Dwight Oltman. Since then, he has worked with esteemed conductors such as Kathleen Horvath, Darko Butorac, Keith Lockhart, Tito Muñoz, Delta David Gier, Miriam Burns, Daniel Meyer, Harry Davidson, and others. In Fall 2024, he was appointed Assistant Conductor of the Case Western Symphony Orchestra, where he led the premiere of a new orchestral composition. That same semester, he also conducted the premiere of a large ensemble work at CIM. At the age of 16, Nathaniel conducted his first performance with a brass choir, featuring works by Giovanni Gabrieli and modern composers. Throughout high school and college, he has led a variety of orchestras and ensembles, conducting works by Beethoven, Wagner, Sibelius, Mozart, and more.

As a guitarist, Nathaniel has won numerous competitions across the U.S., including in North Carolina, Georgia, and Texas. He has given over 30 solo recitals during his time at CIM, establishing himself as a dynamic and expressive performer. Nathaniel continues to expand his artistic career, blending his expertise as a conductor and guitarist while actively seeking opportunities to collaborate, perform, and innovate in the classical music world.
