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



### **Executive Summary**


A total of 822 students were enrolled for the Fall 2013 semester, which represents an increase in the BSN program over the past five years. The PhD program also showed an increase in enrollment this year. The MSN, Graduate Entry Nursing (MN), and DNP programs have demonstrated stable enrollment.

### **Student Diversity**


Approximately 29.5% of our students self-report as representing a minority, with 39% unreported. This is an increase from last year's 25.4% and is above the national average of 26.5%.

Nationally, our student diversity stands at 34% for BSN compared to a 26.9% national average, 14% for MSN vs. 26.6%, 23% for DNP vs. 22%, and 50% for PhD vs. 24.7%.


In addition, 10.7% of our overall student body are male. Our BSN program is 9% male vs. the 11.4% national average, and our MSN program is 14% male vs. the 9.9% national average.

# Diversity (All Programs)—Ethnicity and Race: 29.5% (N= 489 reporting)





### **Executive Summary**







## Centers of Excellence



### WHO Collaborating Center for Research and Clinical Training in Home Care Nursing

The focus of the WHO Collaborating Center at CWRU is home care nursing—the delivery of health care services in the home setting. Change in all parts of the world, from aging of the population, the increase in chronic diseases, and the development of infectious diseases, places a burden on the existing health care systems. Home care nursing is one solution to the problem.

#### **Key Accomplishments**

- The inaugural conference of the International Home Care Nurses Organization, was held June 2013 at CWRU with approximately 40 abstracts received for presentation
- Prepared for Redesignation. The Center was designated in 1993 and is not automatically re-designated. The redesignation will be for four years from 2013 to 2017. *The Center was redesignated in October 2013*.

### Sarah Cole Hirsh Institute for Best Nursing Practices Based on Evidence

The Hirsh Institute disseminates evidence-based practice information through printed and online publications. It also conducts certification training programs and consulting services for nurses from within and outside Ohio.

#### **Key Accomplishments**

- Two certificate programs were offered over the past year for which 26 certificates were awarded. Provided financial support for two international PhD students
- Provided presentations at several national meetings on evidence-based practice
- Provided funding support for two international graduate students

### University Center on Aging and Health (UCAH)

UCAH's interdisciplinary mission is to foster collaboration among its community of scholars, learners, and practitioners in order to encourage and coordinate innovative interdisciplinary research, education, and service programs relevant to the health and well-being of older adults.

#### **Key Accomplishments**

- Participated with The Greater Cleveland Sports Commission and community partners (in conjunction with the 2012 Ohio Senior Olympics and the 2013 Summer National Senior Games) to support activities for the Cleveland Year of Vitality 2012-2013, including the April 2013 Cellar Conference.
- Five graduate students from diverse disciplines completed the 12-credit graduate certificate program in gerontology

# Centers of Excellence, continued

# Center of Excellence for <u>Self-Management Advancement through Research and Translation</u> (SMART)

The SMART Center is a National Institute of Nursing Research/National Institute of Health-funded Center of Excellence to build the Science of Self-Management (P30 NR010676). It is designed to address self-management research at four levels of system: individual, family, organization, and community.

#### Key Accomplishments

- Completed 4 pilot studies included in the original application and received 36 new grants focused on self-management
- Held two national conferences and an international conference
- Published 20 manuscripts from individuals receiving direct services from the SMART Center and produced a White Paper summarizing the best practices in self-management of health for many populations i.e, diabetes, heart failure, asthma.

# <u>Building End-of-life Science through Positive Human Strengths and Traits</u> (BEST) Center

The BEST Center focuses on quality of life research for seriously ill people, including those who are at the end of life. Its mission is to radically shift the direction of quality of life research. Funding support is by the National Institute of Nursing Research/NIH.

### <u>Full IN</u>clusion of Persons with <u>Disabilities in Self-Management Research (FIND) Lab</u>

The FIND Lab's mission is to promote the full inclusion of persons with disabilities in mainstream health care research through use of Universal Design of Research and to encourage research on the general health care needs of persons with disabilities. It is funded by the National Institute of Nursing Research/NIH.

### Dorothy Ebersbach Academic Center for Flight Nursing

Serves as part of the MSN program's Adult-Gerontology Acute Care Nurse Practitioner Flight Nursing subspecialty. It is the first formal training program of its kind to prepare nurses at the advanced practice level to provide care to individuals outside of hospitals, but at a hospital level of care.

#### **Key Accomplishments**

32 participants for Flight Nursing Summer Camp FY2013 gathered from across the United States as well as Taiwan.

### Quality and Safety Education for Nurses (QSEN) Institute

Funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the QSEN Institute's goal is to address the challenge of preparing future nurses with the knowledge, skills, and attitudes (KSA) necessary to continuously improve the quality and safety of the healthcare systems in which they work.

#### **Key Accomplishments**

- Submitted two grants one to the National Council of State Boards of Nursing and one to an internal call at CWRU for MOOC applications. The MOOC application was supported.
- Coordinated a national conference on quality and safety with an attendance of 350 participants

### **Executive Summary**

Our fiscal health continues to prosper. Total revenues at the Frances Payne Bolton School of Nursing are \$25,798,000. With expenses at \$24,811,000, the total reserve for the year is \$987,000, or 3.8% of our revenue.

24.5% university support





### 2012-2013 Budget: Operating Results








