About Nurse-Midwifery

Certified nurse-midwives (CNMs) provide a range of care for individuals inclusive of all gender identities and sexual orientations, including pregnancy, childbirth, the postpartum period, and care of the newborn. They practice within a health care system that provides for consultation, collaboration, or referral as indicated by the health status of the client, in accordance with the Standards for the Practice of Midwifery, as defined by the American College of Nurse-Midwives (ACNM).

Clinical Partnerships

Nurse-midwives work individually with clinical instructors to complete clinical experiences in various out-patient and in-patient settings to provide optimal care to women.

During your program, you'll gain experience through:

- In-person labor and birth clinical experiences in local hospital systems
- Out-of-state clinical experiences in the final semester
