Program descriptions

Academic Support Resources for Students

Join staff members for a discussion about academic resources, programs and services to help students achieve their academic goals. Learn about Peer Academic Coaching; Supplemental Instruction (SI); Peer Tutoring; Study Group +1; Spoken English programs and seminars; and one-on-one assistance with time management, study skills, test-taking, note-taking strategies and spoken English. Presenters will also discuss UNIV 100, a popular eight-week, non-credit seminar on study skills and time management available to students during the fall and spring semesters.

Disability Resources

Managing a disability and college demands simultaneously may require assistance. Talk with the Disability Resources staff to find out how students access services and accommodations at Case Western Reserve University. Learn about the differences between high school and college and what is expected from students and parents/guardians in this new environment.

Learn By Doing: Internships, Research and More

Experiential education is an important part of the Case Western Reserve experience. Through experiential education, students are able to apply classroom learning to real-world settings. Learn about the different opportunities available to students, including internships, practicum, co-ops, entrepreneurship and research.

Managing CWRU Finances: The Offices of University Financial Aid and Student Financial Services

Representatives from the Offices of University Financial Aid and Student Financial Services will discuss financial aid, student employment, scholarships, loans, payment plans and the student billing system. Staff will review payment due dates and answer questions on both financial aid and the payment process.

Pre-Med Pathways at CWRU

The Director of Pre-Professional Advising and Career Outcomes will share best practices on pursuing the pre-med path at CWRU to support your student in their journey to medical school.

Staying Connected and Letting Go

"Should I ask about the exam?" "Why doesn't she text me back?" This interactive program is designed to help family members anticipate the changes that may occur in their relationship with their student. New ways of interacting and providing support will be addressed by staff from University Health & Counseling Services.

Student Safety: Security and support in the CWRU Community

The CWRU Division of Public Safety will review safety information, crime prevention tips and safety-related services provided by the campus police and the university, such as transport services and emergency notification. The University Office of Student Conduct and Community Standards will discuss how and why your student may interact with the office, expectations about behavior and the importance of making good decisions. The Flora Stone Mather Center is home to CWRU's confidential Student Advocate for Gender-Based Violence, and the "It's On CWRU" campaign works to create a culture of consent and reduce power-based personal violence in our community.

Study Abroad Redefined: Developing the Competitive Edge

Students who study abroad show an increase in academic engagement upon return to campus, get multiple job offers with higher starting salaries after graduation, and are overall more satisfied with their careers and more confident in themselves. This session will explore CWRU's various education abroad opportunities and how to make them happen financially, academically, and personally—whether that's a semester or summer of study, an international internship, a research project abroad or traveling with CWRU faculty and students as part of a CWRU class. Ensure your student develops the global and intercultural competencies necessary for success in today's world.
