Presenters' Biographies



Beverly Daniel Tatum, PhD, is an internationally known leader, psychologist, and educator who has conducted research and written about race and racial and cultural identity among youth in America. Dr. Tatum is President Emerita of Spelman College, the oldest historically Black women's college in the United States. She served as the College's president for 13 years. Dr. Tatum is the author of several books, including *Why are All the Black Kids Sitting Together in the Cafeteria?* More recently, she published the book, *Can We Talk About Race?* Dr. Tatum continues to highlight the need for conversations about race and its impact on the lives of youth, their families, and communities.



Barbara R. Snyder is President of Case Western Reserve University (CWRU). She is the first woman to serve as the University's president. President Snyder has an impressive record as a national and internationally acclaimed leader in higher education. Before taking the helm as President of CWRU, she served as the Executive Vice President and Provost of The Ohio State University. During her tenure as President, she has made great strides in academic innovations and presided over increased fundraising in philanthropic contributions and research. President Snyder embraces diversity and inclusion at CWRU as a core value, and is respected and appreciated for her dynamic leadership.
