Vaccine Hesitancy: A Conversation

Date: October 28, 2021 | 2:30 - 5:00PM | Guilford House

Purpose

The Department of Bioethics would like to engage the Provost Scholars in a conversation surrounding vaccine hesitancy and the COVID-19 pandemic. The COVID-19 pandemic has illuminated a need to better understand why individuals are hesitant to receive a vaccine. Students will learn about the history of vaccines and discuss how systemic racism has contributed to hesitations to receive a vaccine. Using vaccine hesitancy as a lens to discuss medical mistrust, racial discrimination, and misinformation students will be able to share their opinions, what they have heard, and even their own fear of receiving a vaccine. The goal of this seminar is to engage adolescents in a discussion that is at the forefront of everyone's minds.

Kaitlynn Craig, MA, MHM is a bioethicist and a researcher in the Department of Bioethics at Case Western Reserve University. Kaitlynn recently graduated with her masters in healthcare management from the Weatherhead School of Management and previously held a masters degree in bioethics. She is currently working on a project to better understand and engage adolescents in discussions surrounding medical mistrust, racial discrimination, and misinformation. Kaitlynn conducts other research surrounding ethical oversight for human- animal chimera research as well as interviewing families about how they best prepare for a child with a genetic condition. Kaitlynn strives to engage the surrounding Cleveland communities in the research she conducts and looks forward to having even more meaningful connections.

- Contextualize the history of vaccines and how systemic racism has contributed to current hesitation to receive a vaccine.
- engage in conversations to learn varying perspectives on the hesitation/willingness to receive a vaccine.
