Mark I. Singer, Ph.D. is the Leonard W. Mayo Professor of Family & Child Welfare, and Deputy Director of the Begun Center on Violence Prevention Research and Education at the Jack, Joseph and Morton Mandel School of Applied Social Sciences, and Professor of Psychiatry at the School of Medicine, Case Western Reserve University. He has had extensive clinical experience, including developing and directing two adolescent psychiatric units specializing in co-existing mental and substance disorders.

Dr. Singer's academic career has focused on examining the consequences of violence exposure and he has been the recipient of federal, state and local foundation research grants. He has published numerous articles and book chapters addressing the psychological and behavioral sequelae of exposure to violence in both children and adults. Dr. Singer has lectured nationally and internationally on issues related to youth violence, and has presented findings from his research to governmental groups such as the National Governors' Association and the Ohio State Cabinet. He also works with law enforcement to establish linkages between police officers and social services and is currently a member of the Cuyahoga County Metropolitan Housing Authority Police Department.
