- A 1 2 page story about:
- Academics
- Achievements
- Aspirations



Statements from CWRU Social Science Faculty

"We are looking for clear indications that the student understands what medical anthropology is...."

"When discussing academic topic, give examples of research questions you would like to potentially pose in your work...."

"I would much rather hear about work that changed them, motivated them....I want to know what kind of impact the work may have had on them and the impact it could have on their field...."

"Students need to have the ability to think independently..."

Signpost, Review

Write a Draft

Request Input from Experts Friends (who write well) Faculty (who care) SOURCE staff



Do Not's of a Personal Statement...

Do NOT use the same personal statement for each school

Do NOT assume schools are always looking for a 'personal' story; be authentic

Avoid Cliches'

Avoid Claims and Opinions



Tips and Reminders

- 10. Demonstrate Intellectual Curiosity
- 9. Describe how PERSONAL experience led to RQs
- 8. Highlight aspirations to work with specific faculty
- 7. Mention more than one faculty; they leave, retire, etc.
- 6. Have a conversation with faculty at prospective institution



Top 10 Personal Statement TIPS (ct'd)

5. Discuss future goals, and why grad degree is necessary

- 3. Reframe negative stuff in positive way (see flier)
- 2. Be specific about academic interests, but open to change
- 1. Establish a balance between Personal and Professional




