CHILD CARE PROGRAMS

CWRU supports our working parents with several child care-related benefits and resources. OFFICE OF EQUITY

CWRU, through the Office of Equity, supports pregnant students, postdoctoral scholars and fellows, faculty, and staff so they can achieve academic and work success while pregnant, recovering from the birth of a child, caring for a newborn, and breastfeeding an infant. Title IX (which prohibits gender discrimination against students), Title VII (which prohibits gender discrimination in employment), and the Pregnancy Discrimination Act prohibit schools and employers from penalizing students and employees because they need time off from work or school, or reasonable adjustments, due to pregnancy, childbirth, or caring for an infant. CLOTH DIAPER ASSISTANCE

If you are a caregiver of a young child and are struggling to pay for single-use diapers, apply to the Cloth Diaper Assistance program. CUYAHOGA COUNTY BOARD OF HEALTH - IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

Offer immunizations for infants, children, teens, and adults. Call 216.201.2041 or email ccbhnurse@ccbh.net to make an appointment. Immunization clinic hours are Monday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 9am to 4pm. Limited availability on Fridays. Some children may be eligible for low or no cost vaccines if the child is uninsured, underinsured, or on Medicaid. We also accept most insurance and out-of-pocket payments.

CUYAHOGA COUNTY FATHERHOOD INITIATIVE

GODS VISION FOUNDATION

Gods Vision Foundation has five main family outreach programs. These include Fill the Backpack Program, "Adopt-a-Family" Program, Joy for Kids This Christmas, Easter Celebration, and Moms, Fathers, & Babies Program. The "Adopt-a-Family" Program, Joy for Kids This Christmas, and Easter Celebration focus on providing gifts and food during the holiday seasons. Fill The Backpack Program provides backpacks filled with school supplies, clothing, and other school-related items to ease the burden of back-to-school spending for families. Mom, Fathers, and Babies Program provides essential items including parent connect groups; free cribs; free monthly diapers, milk, and other essential baby items; and workshops on breastfeeding, sleeping training, and more. JOBS AND FAMILY SERVICES - PREVENTION, RETENTION, AND CONTINGENCY

If you have an emergency that is a one-time, short-term crisis, the Prevention, Retention, and Contingency program may be able to help. To qualify, you must be a US citizen or qualified alien; you must live with at least one minor child, be pregnant, or be the non-custodial parent of a child; your family's income must be at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level; and you must have limited liquid assets. 


RAINBOW CAR SEAT DISTRIBUTION PROGRAM

STEP FORWARD



Provides Head Start and Early Head Start programs. Early Head Start and Head Start are available at no cost to income-eligible families. Eligible participants include children whose families are living at or below the Federal Poverty Guidelines. Step Forward provides family development through services that support early learning, health, and family wellbeing. To begin the Head Start preschool enrollment process, please complete the Step Forward online application.

GOVERNMENT FINANCIAL RESOURCES

JOB AND FAMILY SERVICES - CHILD CARE CHOICE PROGRAM

The Ohio Department of Job and Family Services offers financial assistance to eligible parents to help them with childcare costs while they engage in work, education, and job training. Ohio's Publicly Funded Child Care program (see Step Forward above) serves families earning up to 145% of the federal poverty level. The Child Care Choice Program provides financial support to families working or going to school whose income is at 146%-200% of the federal poverty level based on family size. The Child Care Choice voucher payments will assist with the cost of tuition for any child whose family meets the eligibility requirements of the Child Care Choice Program.

Documents required include details about your household, information about your income or pay stubs, where you work or go to school, name and address of your childcare provider, and birth certificates for your children who need care. Apply online for the Child Care Choice Program here.

WOMEN, INFANT, AND CHILDREN (WIC) ASSISTANCE

WIC is the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children. WIC helps eligible pregnant and breastfeeding women, women who recently had a baby, infants,



and children up to 5 years of age. WIC provides nutrition education, breastfeeding education and support; supplemental, highly nutritious foods such as cereal, eggs, milk, whole grain foods, fruits and vegetables, and iron-fortified infant formula; and referrals to prenatal and pediatric health care and other maternal and child health and human service programs. To apply for WIC benefits, please visit a WIC clinic near you. The closest to campus is University WIC at 5805 Euclid Ave, Room 101, UH Rainbow Center for Women and Children. Phone number is 216.675.6605. Open Monday and Thursday from 8:30am to 4:30pm. Proof of identity should be brought to your appointment.

CASH ASSISTANCE - OHIO WORKS FIRST TANF

Ohio Works First provides cash assistance to eligible low-income families and children for up to 36 months using the state's portion of Federal Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) dollars. Ohio Works First is available to the following groups who can meet financial and participation requirements: Families with at least one child under age 18 or age 19 if still in high school or women who are at least six months pregnant. Once an application is submitted, a caseworker from Cuyahoga County will be in touch to schedule your interviews and help guide you through the process. To receive OWF, work-eligible recipients are required to participate in work activities every month that assistance is received. You must also be a U.S. Citizen or a lawful permanent resident, a resident of the state of Ohio, and make less than or equal to 50% of the Federal Poverty Level.
