
LACTATION ROOMS

CLOTH DIAPER ASSISTANCE



If you are a caregiver of a young child and are struggling to pay for single-use diapers, apply to the Cloth Diaper Assistance program. Newborns receive 20 cloth diaper changes, infants 15 changes, and potty-training toddlers 10 changes. These diapers are distributed as a loan and must be returned to the program. CLEVELAND DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH - IMMUNIZATION SERVICES

JOBS AND FAMILY SERVICES - PREVENTION, RETENTION, AND CONTINGENCY

If you have an emergency that is a one-time, short-term crisis, the Prevention, Retention, and Contingency program may be able to help. To qualify, you must be a US citizen or qualified alien; you must live with at least one minor child, be pregnant, or be the non-custodial parent of a child; your family's income must be at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level; and you must have limited liquid assets. SLEEP IN HEAVENLY PEACE

Sleep in Heavenly Peace makes and delivers twin size beds as supplies and donations allow. To qualify as a bed recipient, you must be the legal guardian of the child or children ages 3-17 years old receiving the bed. GOVERNMENT FINANCIAL RESOURCES

JOB AND FAMILY SERVICES - CHILD CARE ASSISTANCE

The Ohio Department of Children and Youth helps parents who are working or in school pay for child care through the Publicly Funded Child Care program. You may be required to pay for part of your child care in the form of a copayment. The amount you pay is based on your gross income and family size. You must be at or below 145% of federal poverty level for your family size when you first apply. You may apply online for the Publicly Funded Child Care program here.

JOB AND FAMILY SERVICES - CHILD CARE CHOICE PROGRAM



The Child Care Choice Program supports families with paying for child care who are above the income threshold for the state's Publicly Funded Child Care program but whose gross monthly income falls between 146% and 200% of the Federal Poverty Level. You can apply for the Child Care Choice program here. Documents needed include details about your household, information about your income or pay stubs, where you work or go to school, name and address of your child care provider, and birth certificates for your



children who need care.

WOMEN, INFANT, AND CHILDREN (WIC) ASSISTANCE

WIC is the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children. WIC provides free healthy foods, breastfeeding support, nutrition education and referrals to other services, to support you and your family. Call University WIC at 216.875.8805 to schedule an appointment. Located at 5805 Euclid Ave, Room 101, inside UH Rainbow Center for Women and Children. Pregnant and breastfeeding women; women who recently had a baby; infants birth through 12 months, and children age 1 to 5 years of age are eligible. You must also present at the clinic appointment and provide proof of identity, be a resident of the State of Ohio, be determined by health professionals to be at medical/nutritional risk and meet income guidelines (185% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines).

CASH ASSISTANCE - OHIO WORKS FIRST TANF

The Ohio Works First (OWF) program is time-limited cash assistance to eligible families through Ohio's Temporary Assistance to Needy Families program. The OWF cash benefit is limited to 36-months for families with minor children and pregnant women. OWF is available to families with at least one child under age 18, or age 19 if still in high school, and women who are at least six months pregnant. Once an application is submitted, a case worker from Cuyahoga County will be in touch to schedule your interviews and help guide you through the eligibility interview.

You may apply for <u>Ohio Works First online</u> by going to Ohio Benefits. Verification documentation includes social security card, Permanent Resident Card or proof of U.S. Citizenship, proof of income, most recent bank statements, proof of values of any stocks/bonds/certificates of deposits/life insurance policies/trust/annuities, proof of any child/dependent care costs, and proof of any child support paid for children not living with you.
