All University students are invited to meet the University Trustees at a sherry hour on Monday, April 18. This year's informal gathering will be held in Room 13 of Crawford Hall, from 5-6 pm.

The trustee-student sherry hour enters its third year at CWRU. While it hasn't yet been formalized into an "annual event," some CWRU students believe it should be.

"The sherry hour provides an opportunity for exchange of concerns between individual students, and the top 'governing' body at the University. Both students and trustees gain a greater sense of humanness in the University process," advocates Joseph Carney, chairman of the Committee of Student Senators.

Carney, a law student, believes the CWRU structure lends itself more to isolation within schools, than mixing among them. "This is a chance, not only to meet trustees, but other interested students. It's really a lot of fun."

Jeff Greer, president of the Undergraduate Student Association is encouraged by the experiment. "The trustees are totally accessible during this period. If you come with a very specific problem, don't be surprised if a trustee asks you to follow up on it, by writing him." He reports, "Students are on the receiving end of the sum of University policies, Trustees are on the guiding end. This is one of the rare chances for an empathetic viewpoint."

Both Carney and Greer agree that the Sherry Hours add a valuable channel for communication. "The student government process does not function perfectly. Some concerns are slow to be articulated to the elected student leaders," says Greer. "At the Faculty Senate, all

"At the Faculty Senate, all attention is directed to one item at a time, so those student concerns which get attention are carefully chosen," remarked Carney.

At the sherry hour, there are no such limits.

## Earth Day observance begins

Next Friday is Earth Day and The University Recycling Center (TURC) is celebrating with a full schedule of events throughout the week.

Beginning Friday and Saturday, April 15 and 16, TURC will be recycling bottles, in addition to its present paper and motor oil reclamation services. The bottles should be clean, free of metal and labels, and sorted by color before being brought to the site.

Opportunities for discussion with the speakers will be available, and any interested students, faculty and citizens are encouraged to come and voice their own opinions.

To finish out the week, there will be a bike hike and picnic Saturday, April 23. Bikers should meet in the Case Quad between Bingham and Olin buildings at 9 am. The trip will be to North Chagrin Park.

Lunch should be brought, although the Recycling Center will provide beverages and charcoal for cooking. Any one interested can also visit the North Chagrin Metropark Interpretive Center, which is heated by solar energy.

The Recycling Center will
