Building Capacity to Engage Authentically at the Intersection of Race, Power, and Food Systems

REQUIREMENTS

Background: Nourishing Power Network

The Nourishing Power Network is a community action research project supported by three organizations in Greater Cleveland: Swetland Center for Environmental Health at Case Western Reserve University, The FARE Project, and Neighborhoods Connections. The Network is committed to rooting and growing a food system that works for Black, Latino/a/x, Asian, and Indigenous communities in the Greater Cleveland area. We seek to achieve this goal by bridging community power with organizational power to spark and expand food justice initiatives led by the community. Launched in July 2022, the Nourishing Power Network is implementing a four-part, systems change strategy to further a culture of nutrition equity in food systems work locally. The four components are designed to meet people where they are based on capacity, skills, and interests.

We hope that these activities will create synergies that result in the following impacts:

- Community Transformation in Black, Latino/a/x, Asian, and Indigenous Neighborhoods
 - o Dignified experiences for housing using emergency food strategies to meet basic food needs
 - Availability and affordability of fresh and healthy foods in food stores
 - Greater demand for fresh and healthy foods among consumers
 - Community ownership of food systems work
- Agency and Empowerment
 - o Freedom, hope, and dignity in food traditions
 - Community members in key decision making and leadership roles for local food systems work
 - o Shared power relationship between community and organizational partners working for food justice
- Health Equity
 - Healthy body, mind, and spirit
 - Food security

CURRENT REQUEST

We are seeking a consultant to support the Nourishing Power Network as it works to build capacity among its Advisory Council (10 community leaders + 2 staff), leadership team (3 organizational leaders + 2 Advisory Council members), and other partners (i.e., Fellows, Mentors) to engage authentically at the intersection of race, power, and food systems. This capacity has been identified as a leverage point to tip the food system to fairness in Greater Cleveland. This is particularly important because of the Network's goal to bridge community power with organizational power to root and grow a food system that works in Black, Latino/a/x, Asian, and Indigenous communities. In short, we need the skills to engage across diverse and intersectional social positions to achieve our bold goals. Specifically, we are seeking a consultant to provide the following deliverables from February 2023 to October 2023.

- Deliverable 1 to be completed by March 2023 (approx. 10 hr). Skill building workshop (2 hr) to help members of the Nourishing Power Advisory Council and the Leadership Team learn and practice skills for sharing and/or receiving feedback about issues or concerns that arise at the intersection of race, power, and food systems. This includes skills for using this authentic feedback to guide future processes and actions of the group. The goal is to align this skill building in a manner that helps us actualize team agreements of the Nourishing Power Network including:
 - o **Take space, make space.** All voices are important.
 - Be fully present. Limit electronics and side conversations.
 - Lean into the conversation. Engage in active listening.
 - o Intent does not equal impact. Assume good intentions. Be mindful of your potential impact.
 - Take the lessons, leave the names. If someone shares something sensitive or confidential, avoid using their name or organization when sharing lessons with people outside of this event.
 - o **Have fun!** Meet someone new, try something different.
- **Deliverable 2 to be completed by June 2023 (approx. 15 hr)**. Work with the Advisory Council to develop a second skill building working similar to Deliverable 1 that is designed for Nourishing Power Fellows, Mentors, and/or other members of the Nourishing Power Network. The workshop would be conducted in spring 2023 with up to 20 attendees.
- Deliverable 3 to be completed by September 2023 (approx. 7 hrs). Serve as an external observer of Advisory
 Council Meetings and facilitate reflective conversations at the end of the May and September Advisory Council
 Meetings that allow for processing of issues or concerns that arise at the intersection of race, power, and food
 systems. Support the team in applying skills learned during the workshop outlined in Deliverable 1. This involves
 attendance at the Nourishing Power Advisory Council Meetings on these dates. These are in-person meetings.

 - September 22, 2023: 10:30am 1pm

• Deliverable 4 - to be completed by October 2023 (approx. 10 hrs). Debrief lessons learned and insights gathered related to the project deliverables by attending at least five (1 hour per meeting) Nourishing Power Leadership Meetings between January and October 2023. These will be planned in partnership with the consultant at approximately February, March, May, June, October 2023.
