### 2020 Internship Application Cycle Now Open!

The application cycle for 2020 Swetland Center Summer Internships are now open! In this 10-week program, interns will take part in professional development opportunities by working alongside Center team members and through engagement in a weekly colloquium to foster praxis, reflection, and technical skill-building. Four interns will be selected to work on one or more specific projects throughout their internship based on Swetland Center needs. Interns are expected to work with research project staff 20 hours per week and will receive a monthly stipend of \$1,200 (Total = \$2,400).

The Swetland Center is sending a warm welcome to our new post-doctoral scholar, Eun Kyung Lee, who will be working with Modeling the Future of Food in Your Neighborhood (foodNEST 2.0) team. Eun Kyung recently obtained her PhD in Environmental Health Sciences from the University at Albany, State University of New York. Her PhD research work encompassed assessing the environmental impacts associated with crop production in the U.S. Midwest as well as examining respiratory effects associated with residential proximity to biorefineries in New York State. Prior to her doctoral program, she obtained a Master's in Public Health at Tufts University where her thesis focused on examining the environmental risk factors associated with food insecurity in rural areas of Guatemala. 
