Varied Impact of COVID-19 on Food Security Calls for Tailored Municipal Response

The Food Security and COVID-19 Study – a supplement to foodNEST 2.0 – found that the pandemic shed light on enduring food security problems in Cuyahoga County and that, despite a common shock like COVID-19, food initiatives require tailored interventions to the unique environment of each community. Furthermore, the supplement found that the pace at which we achieve community vitality in the wake of the pandemic depends on whether we deploy strategies that fully tackle the reality and the root causes of food insecurity. The data brief contains suggested actions that communities can take to tackle the reality and the root causes of food insecurity. The findings are based on data collected between March and May 2021. Funding Awarded to "From Farmers to Families Study"

Congratulations to Swetland Center's Owusua Yamoah for being awarded funding for

her "From Farmers to Families (F-cube)" Study. This work will explore the collaborative efforts between distributors, farmers, food banks and distributions sites in the implementation of the Farmers to Families program and the impacts of the program on implementation sites and households in Ohio and Michigan through interviews with food pantry managers, distributors, farmers, and households in both states. This study is funded by the Nutrition and Obesity Policy Research and Evaluation Network (NOPREN) Coordinating Center at the University of California San Francisco's Center for Vulnerable Populations.
