foodNEST 2.0 Research Published in Special Issue of Nursing Research

Check out recent research from the foodNEST 2.0 team published in a special issue of *Nursing Research* focused racism, stress, and health. The team's paper entitled, [Racialized Experiences Differentiate Food Security among African American Adults](#), was a joint research endeavor between investigators from Nationwide Children's Hospital, University of Virginia School of Education and Human Development, and the Swetland Center. The paper moves beyond analyzing race as a biological variable and highlights how experiences of racism, such as how one is treated because of their race, structure food insecurity. This research provides evidence supporting intervention targets such as wages, education, home ownership, and employment that may be modulated to mitigate the effects of racism on food insecurity.
